The maximum level of guranteed funds (according to the Article 23, paragraph 2 of the Act on Bank Gurantee Fund of December 14, 1994) will be changing as follows:

- -since 1 January 2000 up to the equivalent of 11,000 Euro
- -since I January 2001 up to the equivalent of 15,000 Euro
- -since I January 2002 up to the equivalent of 17,000 Euro
- -since I January 2003 up to the equivalent of 20,000 Euro

Up to the end of 1999, in the case of the following banks: PKO, BP, PKO SA, BGZ SA, the Treasury (in compliance with the Article 56 of the Banking Act) will be liable for the obligations of the banks to the extent of sums in excess of the gurantees cover obtaining under the statutory system of deposit gurantees set out in the Act on the Bank Gurantee Fund, where such sums are due to the following savings deposits:

- a) housing savings books issued no later than October 23, 1990.
- b) savings-and-loan accounts held in accountholders' names at banks operating housing credit associations under procedure set out in seperate regulations, where such deposits have been held for no less than two years, with this liability being applicable to the equivalent of three times the cover provided under the gurentees of the Bank Gurantees Fund,
- c) those where liability has been assumed under gurantees and endorsements.

Loan loss provisioning

- Assets past due between 30 and 90 days ("substandard") require a 20 percent provision.
- Those past due between 91 and 180 days ("doubtful") require a 50 percent provision.
- Those past due more than 180 days ("lost") require a 100 percent provision.

Lending limits

- Large exposures are defined as those debtors whose loans exceed 10 percent of capital in the aggregate. Aggregate large exposures are limited to 800 percent of capital.
- Aggregate direct lending to bank directors, managers, and members of their statutory bodies is limited to 10 percent of capital (25 percent in cooperative banks).
- Aggregate lending (including purchase of bonds and issue of guarantees) to insiders, i.e., entities linked by capital or organization with the bank and having joint economic risk with the bank, is limited to 25 percent of capital.

Capital concentration

- The amount of shares and stakes acquired by a bank in a non-bank entity is limited to 15 percent of capital.

Foreign exchange

- The net open position in a single currency is limited to 15 percent of capital.
- The net open position in all currencies is limited to 30 percent of capital.
- The sum of the absolute value of the net positions in all currencies is limited to 40 percent of
