#### Direct taxes

# 1.1 Business profit tax (Contribulção industrial)

Levied on income from commercial or industrial activities, whether permanent or occasional; chargeable to individuals and to legal entities having their main offices or a permanent agency in Guinea-Bissau and to nonresidents who are owed payments or loans by resident entities, for the exercise of such activities and for a period of less than six months; withholding at source of 15 percent of taxable base; and withholding at customs of 3 percent of c.i.f. value of selected imports. In addition, the central government, the local authorities, public agencies, and autonomous fund have been required, since the approval of the 1997 budget, to withhold 3 percent on their payments to contractors for supplies of goods and services. This withholding constitutes an advance on the business profit tax due.

For corporations without accounting records and small business volume (less than CFAF 7.7 million in sales), taxation is made on a presumptive basis at the applicable rate.

Exemptions granted to legally constituted political parties; employers' and professional associations; legal entities engaged in activities in the public interest; international organizations deemed legal entities under international public law; diplomatic missions; religious organizations, and welfare, sports, cultural, recreational, and similar associations.
