Losses generated in a taxable year may be carried forward from year to year, until their full amount has been offset against the net income obtained in the 4 immediately subsequent fiscal years following the first year in which profits were generated. The balance which cannot be offset once this time period has lapsed may not be offset in subsequent years.

Remarks

Starting in 2001, allowable deductions of expenses to maintain the source of income are possible unless expenses are incurred in countries with low or no taxation (tax-havens), or paid through persons or entities domiciled in such locations.

In 2000, the tax exemption on distribution of profits by mining companies was climinated. Nonetheless, companies with approved investment projects at that time continue to enjoy the benefit.

Interest derived from the use of external credit lines by banks or financial institutions continue to be taxed at 1 percent. Interest derived from external loans in cash and posted as a credit to Peru's foreign currency income, or loans at a discounted annual interest rate lower than the prevailing preferential interest rate in the source market plus 3 points, as well as import credits are taxed at a rate of 4.99 percent. The rest of interest payments on external loans are taxed at a rate of 30 percent.

Exports of goods and services, as well as construction contracts performed abroad, are not subject to the IGV.

Exporters may apply the balance of the tax credit against the income tax or other tax liabilities representing income for the National Treasury. Any residual amount may be refunded in the form of marketable tax certificates (Notas de Crédito Negociables--NCN) or in cash.

The following are regarded as exports of services:

- Consulting and technical assistance
- Leasing of movable property
- Advertising, market research, and public opinion survey services
- Personnel placement and administration
- Commissions on the provision of credit
- Financing, insurance, and reinsurance operations
- Telecommunications
- Tourism operators (only for sales abroad)

IGV withholding schemes:

Law 27799 of 2002 states that withholding tax agents should be selected by SUNAT. The withholding mechanisms adopted include: large taxpayers are required to withhold 6 percent of their purchases above US\$ 200, large fuel sellers withhold I percent of the sale price in transactions with fuel retailers; and large buyers of agricultural products (rice, sugar, and alcohol) withhold 10 percent of the sale price.
