

## Figure 3.21. Labor Income Inequality in the 2000s (Points)

Labor income inequality is somewhat lower in industry than in services, but country characteristics dominate in explaining within-sector inequality in both industry and services.

The measure of inequality used is generalized entropy based on disposable income (see Annex 3.4 for details). Panel 1 shows the cross-country distribution of labor income inequality in industry and services; the contribution of differences in average earnings across sectors to aggregate inequality; and aggregate inequality. The horizontal line inside each box represents the median; the upper and lower edges of each box show the top and bottom quartiles; and the red markers denote the top and bottom deciles. Data labels in panel 2 use International Organization for Standardization (ISO) country codes.
